Dear Friends of the Philharmonic.

If last year was marked by us returning to the concert hall, then this year has been marked by us getting everyone else to return to the concert hall! This season, we haven't seen the COVID reluctance of last year. We are, however, seeing COVID-inspired inertia.

We're not alone here. Our local restaurants are seeing it. Our partners in the arts are seeing it. Our colleagues at the League of American Orchestras are seeing it. The list goes on.

We're seeing something else, too, however. We're seeing more children at our concerts than we've ever seen before. Thanks to Visions Federal Credit Union, our Season Sponsor, and M&T Bank, our Classical Series Sponsor, we're able to offer free tickets to kids 17 and under—and it shows. Our opening night concert,

American Journey, had more children in the audience than I've ever seen at any concert I've ever attended. And did you see the crowd at Winter Wonderland? We had over 1100 at the Forum, and about one third of that audience was made up of children.

Those free kids' tickets are just one way the Binghamton Philharmonic continues to meet its mission while also working to mitigate COVID-inspired inertia. For me, I can think of nothing better than having children and families hear a live symphony orchestra and sharing that experience with you, our tried and true patrons. I am sure you agree!

Engaging Our Communities

A community can be defined by affinity group, ethnic group, civic association, neighborhood, or just about anything that gives people a reason to be together. "Engaging Our Communities," an initiative spearheaded by the Philharmonic board, works to create three Philharmonic touchpoints for area communities, all in an effort to bring new audiences to the concert hall. The touchpoints typically include: a "Quaver Has a Feeling" presentation for children and families; a visit from Maestro Hege to talk about an upcoming concert; and complimentary tickets to that upcoming concert. This season, we are working with area Boy and Girl Scouts on their music merit badges, including attendance at dress rehearsals and concerts. We will also meet with a homeschooling association this spring for a Quaver reading and a Maestro visit, while also providing concert tickets.

Just prior to January's Wallenberg Festival, students from the Binghamton City School District will attend "Ties and Tutus" at DoubleTree. This free dinner and Maestro visit is a fun and entertaining prelude to the evening's performance. Quaver Has a Feeling

This past summer, the Binghamton Philharmonic launched our newest educational outreach program, "Quaver in Every Corner." This program was born out of two prior COVID-19 projects: "Concerts in Every Corner," which featured small pop-up concerts all around the community, and our collaboration with local author Lenora Reigel to create a musical children's book, "Quaver Has a Feeling." The book tells the tale of a curious music note named Ouaver, who learns about his feelings through musical excerpts. The book features QR codes for each feeling which lead the reader to playable recordings of the Binghamton Philharmonic's Wallenberg Legacy archive.

In our "Quaver in Every Corner" program, the story is brought to life



through narrator Erika Dentinger and Philharmonic musician April Lucas. With the help of NYSEG, Erika and April have been able to perform at ten different locations, including the Binghamton Housing Authority, Urban League, YWCA, and even Spiedie Fest. This season, we look forward to transitioning the program into local school districts, with the help of funding from the Hoyt Foundation. Through this program, hundreds of children

have been given the opportunity to experience live music while simultaneously learning about their feelings and developing emotional intelligence. In the lyrical words of Quaver, "My feelings are a part of me, not good, not bad, just there!"
